Union Home Minister Amit Shah has said that Northeast students will not need to leave their region for work. They will get employment opportunities there. Mr. Shah said this while addressing the students from the Northeast at Youth Parliament organised by Students' Experience In Inter-State Living in New Delhi today.

Mr. Shah underscored that by 2027, the capitals of all the states in the North-East will be connected by train, air, and road. Emphasizing the need for further investment in the region, he said, India's longest rail-cum-road bridge is being planned to be built at the Brahmaputra. Rail-line is also being built between Assam

and Bhutan, the Minister said, also highlighting the organic agriculture in Sikkim.

The Lok Sabha has taken up discussion on the second batch of Supplementary Demands for Grants for 2024-25 and on the Manipur Budget. The government has sought Parliament's nod to spend a net additional 51 thousand 462 crore rupees in the current financial year. On Manipur budget for 2025-26, the government envisaged expenditure of over 35 thousand 103 crore rupees, up from 32 thousand 656 crore rupees in the current financial year. Biplab Kumar Deb of BJP said, the Central Government brought development in Manipur with several initiatives and connected the unconnected areas. He said, the Government has removed the Armed Forces Special Powers Act from 75 percent of the areas of the North-East, and the region is witnessing peace and development after 2014 due to the efforts of the Modi Government. Congress MP from Manipur MP Alfred Kanngam S Arthur accused the Centre of disproportionately sanctioning projects in the valleys of Manipur, alleging it was ignoring the hills where 95 percent of the tribal population reside.



President Droupadi Murmu today said that the development of women means the development of society. Educated women create a strong society, she said, while addressing the 10th Convocation of the University in Bathinda.

The President expressed joy that 65 percent of the total medal winners were women. Suggesting five good things to be adopted in life -- Curiosity, Originality, Morality, Farsighted-Ness and Spontaneity, she noted that ethics is the cornerstone of a meaningful life. She urged the students to base their means of achieving goals

on morality. The President expressed confidence that the young students will build a developed India in 2047.



Prime Minister Narendra Modi arrived in Mauritius this morning on a two-day visit to the island nation. He received a warm welcome by Mauritius Prime Minister Navinchandra Ramgoolam at the airport. Mr Modi further noted that the support symbolizes the shared commitment of both countries to fostering a greener and better future.

The wages of Khadi artisans will be increased by 20 percent from April 1 this year. Addressing media in New Delhi, Chairman of the Khadi and Village Industries Commission, Manoj Kumar, said that presently, spinners receive 12 rupees and 50 paisa per hank for spinning on the charkha, which will now be increased to 15 rupees per hank. Mr Kumar said that over the last eleven years, the government has implemented a historic 275 percent increase in the wages of Khadi artisans.



National Health Mission, Nagaland is conducting a special screening drive for Non-Communicable Disease (NCD) till the end of the month. During the drive, free screening for two common NCDs - Diabetes and Hypertension - is being carried out for individuals above 30 years of age across all health units. This intensified drive aims to ensure widespread NCD screening across all corners of Nagaland.
