Governor La Ganesan underscored the significance of integrating modern technology with traditional learning to create a dynamic educational environment that prepares students to navigate the complexities of the modern world. Speaking after inaugurating the Dr. Keshav Baliram Hedgewar Central Library at the International University -- formerly known as The Global Open University -- the Governor urged students to embrace digital tools and online resources available in today's educational landscape. He highlighted the role of libraries in fostering intellectual curiosity, encouraging innovation, and lifelong learning. Lauding the Central Library as a fitting tribute to Dr. Hedgewar's legacy, he called on the community to ensure that it remains a symbol of national unity and intellectual excellence.

La Ganesan expressed confidence that the library would not only benefit the students of Nagaland but also serve as a platform for intellectual and cultural exchange both within India and internationally.

At least four persons were injured in a clash between residents of neighbouring villages in Meluri and Kiphire districts. A preliminary police report from SP Kiphire stated that the incident occurred when villagers from Laruri and Sutsu in Meluri were constructing an approach road and cutting firewood in a disputed area below Khongka village, close to Laruri bridge on Tizu River. The report said, individuals suspected to be from Kiphire's Mimi village and its satellite villages destroyed jungle huts and opened fire, resulting in the injuries. Consequently, a platoon of NAP (IR) from Kiphire HQ was immediately deployed at the conflict area. An EAC along with a police officer from Meluri Police has also moved to Laruri village. SP Meluri is coordinating with Pochury Hoho to ensure safety of travelers from Kiphire district to Kohima and Dimapur via Meluri district. District Administration and District Police are also coordinating with the Yimkhiung and Pochury Hohos to bring the situation under control.



Deputy Chief Minister Y. Patton has appealed to the people of Meluri and Kiphire to maintain peace and harmony in their areas, following recent reports of violent incidents between a few villages over land disputes. Expressing deep concerns over the incident, Mr. Patton said such events not only disrupt peace but also damage the bonds that hold communities together. He informed that the situation is now under control and urged all parties to remain calm and work towards restoring harmony. He emphasized that dialogue and understanding must prevail over conflict. Meanwhile, the Deputy Chief Minister visited the person injured in the incident, who is undergoing treatment at NHAK, this morning. Speaking to media personnel, Mr. Patton said, the two district Deputy Commissioners of Kiphire and Meluri have been assigned to investigate the incident and submit a report through the Commissioner of Nagaland to the state government.

During the visit, Mr. Patton was accompanied by Advisors S. Kiusumew and Z. Nyusietho Nyuthe, Home Commissioner Vyasan R., DGP Rupin Sharma, and Deputy Commissioner of Meluri, Mhathung Tsanglao. In addition to the person being treated at NHAK, three others sustained minor injuries and were discharged from the hospital after necessary treatment.



Eid-ul-Fitr is being celebrated with religious fervour and gaiety across the country today. The festival marks the culmination of the fasting month of Ramzan. Meanwhile, Nagaland Governor La Ganesan also conveyed greetings to the Muslim community of the state. Wishing peace, prosperity and happiness, he encouraged everyone to embrace the occasion with love, forgiveness and generosity, while spreading joy. As Ramzan ends, the Governor expressed hopes that prayers are answered, hearts are filled with gratitude and bonds of unity and kindness are strengthened.

In Myanmar, the death toll in last week's devastating earthquake has crossed two thousand. Myanmar's military leadership today said, over 2,056 people have lost their lives in the powerful earthquake so far while more than 3,900 people have been injured with 270 still missing. The country has announced seven-days of national mourning. Rescue operations are underway in the country in full swing,

while international relief efforts are being swiftly mobilised to address the dire needs of the affected population. India, Russia, UAE, the United Nations and others have sent specialist search and rescue teams alongside humanitarian aid. India has launched Operation Brahma to aid rescue and relief work, pitching in with tonnes of ration and medicines. The External Affairs Ministry said NDRF team has begun rescue operations at the 'U hla thein' monastery, where around 170 monks are still stuck.
