RESOLUTION:

In a significant move, Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio yesterday proposed an allparty delegation under his leadership to meet with the Union Home Minister to express the concerns and sentiments of the people regarding the recent decision to suspend the Free Movement Regime (FMR) along the Indo-Myanmar border. In a statement delivered during the ongoing State Assembly Session, the Leader of the House highlighted the resolution adopted unanimously during the fourth Session of the 14th Nagaland Legislative Assembly on Free Movement Regime along the Indo-Myanmar Border in March last year. He appealed to the Government of India to reconsider its decision to suspend the FMR along the Indo-Myanmar Border.

EXPLORATION:

Nagaland Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio has advocated for the resumption of petroleum exploration and extraction in Nagaland, stating that it will improve the State's finances. He said this remarks during the discussion on the "Exploration & Extraction of Petroleum Oil in Nagaland" in the Assembly yesterday. The Chief Minister highlighted the state's rich oil reserves, with the first discovery made in Wokha district's Changpang in 1973, and production beginning in 1983. However, production ceased in 1994 due to non-payment of royalties and unauthorized extraction. Mr Rio emphasized that the Nagaland Petroleum and Natural Gas Regulations 2012 paved the way for exploration, with Metropolitan Oil and Gas Private limited granted rights in Wokha District. The Chief Minister detailed ongoing efforts with the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas to resolve the deadlock.

BILL:

The Meghalaya Legislative Assembly yesterday passed the Meghalaya Appropriation (No.1) Bill, 2025 to enable the State Government to withdraw an amount of Rupees two thousand one hundred and nine crore, forty lakh, forty-two thousand, seven hundred and thirty four from and out of the Consolidated Fund of Meghalaya for the financial year 2024-25. While tabling the Bill, Meghalaya Chief Minister, who also holds the Finance Portfolio Conrad K. Sangma informed the House in that the amount to be withdrawn from the Consolidated Fund of Meghalaya, will enable the Government to defray the several charges which will come in course of payment during the financial year ending on 31st March, 2025.

CONSULTANCY:

Meghalaya Chief Minister Conrad K. Sangma yesterday informed the state Assembly that there are 39 individual consultants and 69 consultancy firms that are being engaged by the Government for preparation of Detailed Project Reports for various proejcts and schemes in the state. Replying to the question asked by an Oppostion Member, Brightstarwell Marbaniang, who wanted to know the number of independent consultants and consultancy firms in the state, Chief Minister Conrad K. Sangma said Meghalaya was able to receive an amount of Rs. 200 crore rupees through the Challenge-Based Destination Development Scheme due to availability of these highly professional consultancies.
