Prime Minister Narendra Modi will participate in the BRICS Summit in Rio de Janeiro that begins tonight to enhance cooperation among the member countries. The 17th edition of BRICS summit will take up issues of global governance reforms, climate change challenges, Artificial Intelligence among other things. It wants to form a framework to collaborate on expanding cooperation in the areas of health, ethical use of Artificial Intelligence to solve global problems, reform multilateral banks to meet the financial needs of meeting the challenge of climate change and also want to foster a balanced and inclusive global governance.

Union Health Minister Jagat Prakash Nadda today distributed appointment letters to over 1200 nursing officers in the National Capital, along with Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta. Addressing the event, Mr Nadda said that India's health policy today has moved on from curative treatment to preventive

treatment. He remarked that health set-up of the nation today has become inclusive, focusing not just on treatment but also on rehabilitation. Mr Nadda pointed out that despite being allotted 1750 crore rupees 4 years ago, under the PM Ayushman Bharat Health Infrastructure Mission, the previous Delhi government failed to utilize a single penny.

During the occasion, Mr Nadda and Chief Minister Rekha Gupta also flagged off the Ayushman Bharat Registration Vans. These vans will provide registration for the Ayushman Bharat at the doorsteps of residents of the national capital.



Union Minister for Commerce and Industry Piyush Goyal stressed that India's free Trade Agreements will never come at the cost of national interest. Speaking at the FTII Traders Conclave in Srinagar, Mr. Goyal said the government is committed to ensuring that all trade deals are reciprocal and protect the interests of Indian traders and manufacturers. In a clear message to traders in the region, the Minister emphasized that the Centre will not compromise on sensitive sectors or regional concerns while negotiating market access with foreign partners. Mr. Goyal's comments come against the backdrop of the India-US negotiations aimed at concluding a bilateral free trade agreement before the July 9 deadline for the 26 per cent increase in US tariffs on Indian exports kicks in. A trade agreement would exempt Indian exports from the tariff hike.



Union Minister for Cooperation Amit Shah has said that cooperative societies have an important contribution in the economic development of the country. Mr. Shah said this while inaugurating various development works of Amul and NDDB in Anand, Gujarat on the occasion of completion of four years of the Ministry of Cooperation. He added that two lakh new PACs, Sahkarita University, three cooperative societies related to the production and sale of food grains and three cooperative societies related to dairy, together will further strengthen the cooperative movement of the country.



Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman discussed various issues of bilateral cooperation, including collaboration across multiple sectors to further

strengthen strategic partnerships during her meetings with BRICS counterparts in Rio de Janeiro last night. In her meeting with Russian Finance Minister Anton Siluanov on the sidelines of the BRICS Finance Ministers and Central Bank Governors meeting, she discussed issues of bilateral cooperation, particularly in the financial sector, as well as matters related to the New Development Bank. Ms Sitharaman also met with Lan Fo'an, Finance Minister of China and emphasized that India and China are uniquely positioned to drive inclusive global growth and innovation as two largest and fastest-growing economies in the world.

Kohima Police said, an unidentified human skeleton remains was retrieved yesterday from Dzu River downstream at Zero Point, near Chedema. A press release from Superintendent of Police, Kohima informed that the recovery operation was conducted following established procedures. After thorough inquest and post-mortem examination, the remains have been identified as belonging to a female aged approximately 25 to 30 years. The skeletal remains are currently secured at Morgue facility of North Police Station, Kohima, pending identification.
