The 5 Tribes Committee on Review of Reservation Policy has renewed its demand for the state government to take decisive action on its core demands regarding the state's reservation policy. The Committee in a statement expressed concern that despite the state cabinet's announcement to set up a commission to examine the current reservation system, there has been no official response or progress on the committee's demands - either to scrap the existing policy or to allocate the unreserved quota to the five tribes represented by the committee. The committee said no official communication had taken place since the June 3 meeting, and reiterated its dissatisfaction with the delay. The Committee further clarified that the composition of the proposed Commission must exclude civil society organizations from its membership, in order to uphold the neutrality, fairness and integrity of the Commission's work and to prevent any conflict of interest or undue influence. The committee remains committed to constructive engagement but reserves the right to initiate appropriate democratic measures if the issues remain unaddressed within a reasonable timeframe, it added.

President Droupadi Murmu has urged young doctors to work for those sections of society that need medical services the most, underlining that many rural and tribal areas still lack high-quality healthcare services. Addressing the first convocation ceremony of AIIMS Gorakhpur yesterday , she said doctors play a very important role in the development of the country as they not only treat diseases but also lay the foundation of a healthy society.

And, According to weather updates from the Nagaland State Disaster Management Authority (NSDMA), all districts of Nagaland are expected to experience rainfall starting today and continuing until the 8th of this month. These showers may be accompanied by thunderstorms and lightning across the state. Heavy rainfall is also predicted for most districts from tomorrow through Sunday. Kiphire and Tuensang are likely to receive very heavy rainfall on Tuesday and Wednesday. The NSDMA has advised that it is crucial to take necessary precautions during this period, including staying safe from lightning strikes and strong winds. Road transport and connectivity may also be disrupted in the coming days. Due to the potential for high precipitation in hilly areas, the lowland and foothill districts including Dimapur, Niuland, Chümoukedima, Bhandari, Baghty, Tizit, and Tuli may be at risk of waterlogging and flash floods. In light of this, the NSDMA has urged the public to exercise caution and avoid any unnecessary risks during this period.
