The Nagaland government has clarified that civil society organisations (CSOs) are to nominate credible individuals from their communities, not CSO office bearers to the newly formed Job Reservation Commission. This follows objections from the five Tribes Committee, which opposed CSO involvement in the nomination process. Chief Secretary Sentiyanger Imchen emphasized that including community voices is essential for a fair and inclusive review of the reservation policy. He urged CSOs to reconsider their position to ensure a comprehensive report. The seven-member Commission, announced on August 6, includes representatives from the ENPO, CNTC, and Tenyimi Union Nagaland.

The Pochury Hoho has welcomed the Nagaland government's decision to constitute a Reservation Review Commission, calling it a timely step to address disparities in employment among tribes. In a statement, the Hoho expressed confidence in the Commission's ability to ensure fairness, balance, and clarity in the reservation policy. It emphasized that the core of the Backward Tribe policy is to redress historical disadvantages and provide equal opportunities to all recognised tribes. The Hoho also raised concerns over the disproportionate impact of past policy revisions on the Pochury tribe, citing a pattern of systemic neglect. It called for the inclusion of credible and experienced individuals in the Commission to ensure transparency, inclusivity, and the trust of all communities.

The Naga Students' Federation (NSF) has called for an emergency protest against the candidature of non-indigenous candidates under the Nagaland State Quota for NEET 2025 admissions. The protest will be held today. The apex student body emphasized that the State Quota is strictly and exclusively reserved for indigenous Naga candidates, in accordance with existing policies and constitutional safeguards for Scheduled Tribes. The NSF stated that permitting ineligible candidates would deprive deserving indigenous Naga students of their rightful opportunities, set a dangerous precedent for the misuse of temporary postings and affiliations, and undermine the very spirit and intent of the State Quota policy. Reaffirming its commitment to safeguarding the rights and privileges of indigenous Nagas, the Federation warned that it would oppose any attempt to dilute or misuse these provisions. The NSF also appealed to all concerned citizens of Nagaland to join the protest and stand united in defense of the rights of the indigenous Naga people.

External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar has said that the current international environment makes it essential to preserve and enhance stability in the global economy. He also stressed that India seeks a fair, balanced, and multipolar world order, noting that reformed multilateralism is the call of the day. External Affairs Minister yesterday held talks with visiting Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi and underlined that the fight against terrorism in all its forms remains a major priority for India. Mr Jaishankar said India-China relations must be guided by three mutuals, mutual respect, mutual sensitivity, and mutual interest. He added that differences must not become disputes, nor competition turn into conflict.
