MLA Kevipodi Sophie has expressed serious concern over the decades-long delay in completing the Two-Lane Package-4 By-Pass Road from D-Khel, Kohima Village to Kigwema Village. Raising the issue during Question Hour in Assembly yesterday, he noted that the work order for the project was issued in 2000 with an 18-month deadline, but remains unfinished. He said the recent landslide at Phesama, which disrupted National Highway-2, has highlighted the urgent need for the alternate route, especially for commuters and students.

In response, Deputy Chief Minister and National Highways Minister T. R. Zeliang clarified that the project is under the direct purview of the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH), and that the State Government has no control over contractor selection or financial oversight. Mr. Zeliang said the state has repeatedly flagged delays and quality concerns with MoRTH and NHIDCL, but progress remains slow due to the state's limited administrative control over the project.

Raising concerns over growing tensions along the Nagaland-Assam border, MLA Achumbemo Kikon has called for the immediate establishment of permanent police outposts at Tchujanphen under the Rengma Reserved Forest and Lio-Longchum in Wokha under Sector-D. Speaking during the Question Hour in the Assembly yesterday, Mr. Kikon noted that while temporary deployments of Nagaland Armed Police and the Indian Reserve Battalion have been made, a permanent presence is vital for long-term security and stability. He also called for immediate restoration of power supply to a Naga village which had been disconnected during the recent eviction drive. Mr Kikon also pressed for the implementation of a long-pending cabinet decision to establish village guards in sensitive border areas, suggesting this would help ease tensions and reduce the need for frequent security deployments.
