Advisor for Agriculture, Mhathung Yanthan has called for continued creativity, innovation and collective efforts to address emerging challenges in farming, including climate change and evolving agricultural dynamics. Addressing the second day of the Banana Festival at Wokha yesterday, he urged all stakeholders to work together to ensure the benefits of agricultural research and technology reach farmers at the grassroots level. He highlighted that agriculture remains the backbone of Nagaland's economy, engaging nearly 70 percent of its population and contributing 37 percent to the state's Gross State Domestic Product. Mr Yanthan underscored that sustainable agricultural development is key to achieving a Viksit Bharat by 2047.

Reaffirming the government's commitment to empowering farmers, the Minister, expressed optimism that the Banana festival will become an annual event for agricultural collaboration and growth.

The Joint Coordination Committee of Nagaland services association has announced plans to intensify its ongoing 'pen-down and tools-down strike' starting October 27. Mr Along also noted that the festival is a unique platform for cultural exchange and strengthen Nagaland's connection with a wider audience across India. Speaking on the Hornbill Festival, the Minister emphasized the state's efforts to make its tourism policy more visitor-friendly, inviting all those who respect the environment and culture to experience the natural beauty of Nagaland.

The Minister said, to make facilitate travel to Nagaland, the Inner Line Permit process is being simplified, and a dedicated helpline will be launched at Nagaland House in New Delhi, Kolkata and Guwahati.
