India yesterday successfully conducted a salvo launch of two 'Pralay' missiles off Odisha coast in quick succession. The missile was launched as part of user evaluation trials. The test was carried out by the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO). More from our Correspondent:

The 'Pralay' missile is a surface-to-surface, short-range ballistic missile with a strike range of about 150 km to 500 km. It can carry multiple types of warheads against various targets. The government has banned all oral Nimesulide medicines above 100 mg with immediate effect, citing health risks. Nimesulide is a nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drug which is widely used in the treatment of acute pain. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare in a gazette notification said safer alternatives to the Nimesulide drug are available in the market.
